- After the war my Great Gran'ma was really excited to find cotton sheets in the shops again




EVIL EVACUATIONS

SHELTERS DURING AIR RAIDS




THE BLACKOUT

THE BLITZ





- The Blitz was when London was bombed by the Nazis
- It was a horrible time
- People woke up and found their lives completely changed
- My Great Nana met my Great Grandad when she was a teenager because the vicar's house was bombed.
 She knew where to find the vicar and he had a bicycle and offered to take her there!

VE DAY

- This means Victory in Europe!
- It was Tuesday 8th May 1945
- Street parties happened to celebrate the war was over
- King George VI, Queen Elizabeth and the two princesses (one is our Queen now) came out 8 times to the balcony at Buckingham Palace





Churchill's Speech

- Churchill was the Prime Minister
- He announced to the country at 3pm on the radio that the war was over
- Churchill later told the crowds "This is your victory" because everyone did their bit to win the war.





MY FAMILY IN WORLD WAR II

- My Uncle Alan was a hero
- He went to war in the army at age 17
- He had no choice. All young men that were able had to go to war.
- When the young soldiers marched off they sang Pack up your Troubles in your Old Kit Bag. My mum still sings this to us at night time.



- He was in armoured cars and went over to Germany just after D Day.
- This picture was taken as they liberated Helmond in the Netherlands
- Uncle Alan is on top of the tank!
- They were greeted by all the people with fruit, flowers and hugs because they were so grateful





- In the car there were 3 people
 - Driver
 - Gunner
 - Communications person
- One day they came across hostile troops
- The gunner let off a smoke bomb to hide the car
- The driver became a second gunner and the communications person drove the car out backwards to get away quickly!

- On VE day he was stationed in Germany
- He celebrated with his childhood sweetheart Aunty Kath when he got home



Aunty Kath

- My Aunty Kath was at college on VE day
- She woke up in her dormitory to hear a girl running down the corridors ringing a bell shouting "the war is over!!"
- They were allowed to go home for the weekend to celebrate
- She didn't have a big party because my Uncle was still in Germany



Great Nana

- Great Nana was evacuated at age 13. She used to put her feet on hot bricks to keep them warm.
- She later joined the WRNS and worked as a radio mechanic 1944 – 1946
- She was disappointed when the war ended because she was due to go to Australia....luckily they went anyway!!



Great Grandad

- Great Grandad was an officer in the Royal Engineers
- He made sure the tanks were working
- He injured his knee in Italy...falling off his motorbike!
- Once he was on top of a tank when an air raid siren went off
- He got caught by his belt and had to wait until after the enemy planes flew off for someone to come and help him down!

Great Gran'ma and Gran'pa

- Great Gran'ma went back to live in Sunderland during the war
- She was called up to be a nurse but was a trained teacher also
- She was so squeemish that she kept fainting in the operating theatre and had to be taken out to recover! She had to go back in again!

- Great Gran'pa was an accountant
- He worked for the Admiralty making sure that everyone in the war effort got paid.

Everyone celebrated the war was over!
