# International Day

Friday 23rd October

We will be celebrating International Day on **Friday 23rd October**. It will be slightly different from previous years as we will not be able to meet together for a whole school celebration. Each year group will be learning something about the geography, culture and customs of a different country. International day is also an opportunity to celebrate the cultures which are found in our own community and we encourage children to come to school dressed in either clothing that celebrates their **own** cultural heritage.

When thinking about what our children wear on International Day it can be useful to consider the difference between **Cultural Appropriation** and **Cultural Appreciation**. Very simply, cultural appropriation is the adoption of specific elements of one culture by a different cultural group. Cultural appropriation is a problem because it often involves members of a dominant group exploiting the culture of other groups for their own gain, typically with little understanding of the history, culture and customs associated with it. Often, we cross the line into Cultural Appropriation when we perform aspects of a culture that is not our own. This might be 'looking like' or 'sounding like' aspects of the culture. It might also involve acting out elements of culture without respect to the origins of those actions. We want to respect all members of our community and those outside our community. When planning an International Day outfit consider that wearing clothing from a cultural group you do not belong to would like fall under appropriation.

An alternative to cultural dress is to wear clothing in the colours of the flag of the country the year group is learning about.


