
Booking for the Parent consultations will go live at **5pm on Friday 4th March**.

It's the 25th anniversary of **World Book Day** on **Thursday 3rd March** and the theme for this year's celebrations is: **You are a reader!**

At Handsworth, we are encouraging pupils to **dress up** as a book or book character and **make a donation** of £1.

This money will go towards buying Guided Reading and Home Reading books for the school.

Mrs Nairne and Ms Addai will come round to each class to read a story and everyone will be celebrating World Book Day by championing reading through various activities throughout the day. We will also be taking our Year 5 and 6 pupils to a local bookshop to exchange their World Book Day voucher for a book!

We are delighted to welcome local author **Ian Brown** in to school to run an assembly and workshops for EYFS and KS1.

Ian is a TV writer and producer (credits include writing or producing for the likes of Harrison Ford, Pierce Brosnan, Homer Simpson, Youtubers Joe Sugg and Caspar Lee, Jamie Oliver, Gordon Ramsay and many more). He is the author of a series of picture books based on a real tortoise called Albert: *Albert Upside Down* and *Albert and the Wind*.




Ian will talk about writing, tortoises, the real Albert Tortoise, tortoise links to dinosaurs and how they hibernate (imagine sleeping and dreaming for 5 months each year)! He will also sign any of his books that the children bring in.

You can buy Ian's book in advance of the day (local shop *V* and *A* Books on The Avenue will stock them) and send it in with your child on World Book Day (make sure you put a note inside the book with your child's name and class, so that Ian can easily sign it).

Choose your battles

All humans resist feeling controlled by someone else, and children are no different. The more they feel 'pushed around' the more they rebel. That's a good thing! Training a child to be obedient means you always have to be there to give orders, and as they grow up, they may find it more difficult to stand up for themselves. Instead, teaching a child self-discipline raises a child who can think for themselves, stand up for what's right, and isn't likely to be taken advantage of.

How can parents help?

Choose your battles. Make sure your child knows you're on his/her side and that they have some choices. When you feel you are entering a power struggle, offer them two choices that you feel OK with e.g., what would you like to do first: reading or maths? You can also formulate a question, so the child feels that he/she decides e.g., ask a child - what do we usually do after breakfast? Allow the child to answer - brush teeth/ go to school. By giving you the answer, the child does not feel he/she is being told what to do. This will allow them to feel they have some control, while you also continue to hold your boundaries. Coach your child rather than trying to control him/her.





LGBTQ+ History Month

As many of you will know, February is LGBT+ History Month. LGBT+ History Month was launched in 2005 by Schools Out, a UK charity that aims to make all schools and educational institutions safe spaces for LGBT pupils and staff. We recognise this month as an opportunity to acknowledge the rights that these communities have now, to remember those who do not currently have those rights and to help LGBT+ children and families to see themselves in history. This month is a great time to talk to your children about the ways in which we are all free to be ourselves and to celebrate the diversity of our communities.

Below are some straightforward definitions that you can use when you are having these conversations, as well as some resources you might find useful to explore. We will be exploring these issues further during Pride Month in June.




Lesbian: Refers to a woman who is attracted to women



Transgender: Refers to a person whose gender is not the same as the sex they were assigned at birth.







Queer: A term used by those who reject specific labels for their gender and/or sexual orientation.



Bisexual: Refers to a person who is attracted to more than one gender.



Intersex: Refers to a person whose sex characteristics do not fit into categories of 'male' or 'female'

The nurse will be sharing information about how to deal with issues surrounding puberty.








Making friends and getting busy in Reception!

We are excited to be improving our Music Provision across the school. Some of the events and opportunities we are developing include the following:

We have introduced music from different parts of the world and more opportunities for children to sing and perform in class.

The Handsworth Young Voices choir will perform at the O2 on 5th May and will also perform to the school. This week a new choir has started for Years 4 and 5! This takes place on a Wednesday after school. Please contact the school office if your child would like to join.

Each year group play instruments as part of their music lessons with some year groups focusing on learning the recorder and ocarina as part of their lessons in class.
